WOLFVILLE FARMERS' MARKET OPENS DOORS TO NEW HOME

The Wolfville Farmers' Market will be opening the doors to its much anticipated new home at the DeWolfe building on Elm Ave this Saturday, May 21, 8:30am-1pm. Cake will be served, Mike Aubé will perform live and over sixty farmers, chefs and artisans will offer fresh local product.

The 9000 square foot turn of the century apple storage facility has undergone an over \$825,000 renovation to transform it into a structurally sound, purpose-built market space, complete with full accessibility, washrooms, seating area, sinks for food safety and a large space that will be made available to community groups outside of market hours.

"This is the day that we have been eagerly anticipating and working very hard toward for some time. We are very proud that the Wolfville Farmers' Market can offer our customers the very best products that this area has to offer in a safe comfortable environment," said Project Manager and Board President, Angela Patterson.

"I am excited to welcome people into our new home this Saturday," said Market Manager, Kelly Marie Redcliffe. "And look forward, also, to being part of the transition. Every week there will be new things to see, whether it is the installation of new vendor booths, or a stage, or landscaping."

The Wolfville Farmers' Market started out with three vendors working from the trunks of their vehicles in 1992 and has occupied a number of locations over its 18-year existence, but this will be the organization's first permanent year-round space, bringing a new level of service to customers as well as providing convenient, comfortable access to quality local product.

The DeWolfe building will also bring extended hours. Starting June 1, the market will open on Wednesdays from 4-7pm with over 40 vendors, alongside the Market Music Mélange, a new weekly live music night featuring local talent.

The successful completion of the project has been made possible through the financial support of the The Dept of Agriculture (\$250,000), ACOA (\$250,000), The Municipality of Kings County (\$25,000); the vendorship (\$100,000), as well as over 145 community contributors (\$61,000) plus one major contribution from anonymous Wolfville residents (\$100,000). The balance of \$39,000 will be raised through community fund raising.

The Wolfville Farmers' Market will have a grand opening celebration on June 29, 2011.

n Saturday, 30th of April a new bond of friendship was forged between the Wolfville Volunteer Fire department and the warship HMCS HALIFAX. 



Can Textbooks Ever Be Free?

hen I first came to university, I'd had no family or close friends who had attended university before, so I didn't entirely know what to expect. The cost of textbooks was a nearly unanticipated expense. Investigating recently, I've found that, on average, a student in North America pays \$650 per year for textbooks. When you consider the number of students in the country, you find that Canadian students are paying approximately \$565 million dollars for textbooks per year. Extending the scope further, in Canada and the US combined, students pay almost \$10 billion dollars per

Looking at some other online projects over the last 20 years, an pattern emerges that could present a great savings to students and could open up access to information for everyone - open content textbooks.

The way this works is to have an online repository of freely available textbooks to which anyone can contribute content and revisions, and for which anyone can participate in the review and discussions of what to change in the content. It would be online, free to view, and free to

Have you ever had a moment of epiphany in school when you understood something, and said to yourself "Oh! This would have been way easier if they'd just explained it like that!"? Imagine if you could actually make it happen.

In a traditional textbook, you have one or two authors, a few reviewers (if any), and many readers who are passive consumers. In an open online textbook, you have many authors, many reviewers, and many readers who can also choose to be active contributors to the content in the textbook. In a traditional textbook, corrections, updates, and new content must wait for it to be financially viable to publish a new edition. In an open online textbook, once the change is made,



it's published and available - readers can benefit immediately.

I'm not crazy. This general idea has already worked. If it didn't, you wouldn't be browsing the web. If it didn't, you likely wouldn't have Mac OS/X. If it didn't, you wouldn't have many low-cost home media appliances and wireless routers, most of which use open source software under the hood. If it didn't, you would have to know your all favourite web sites by number (e.g. http://131.162.200.8/) instead of by name. Much more closely related to textbook content, Wikipedia, in following this same model, has made the traditional encyclopedia industry almost extinct.

There are a couple groups already moving in this direction. A famous biologist is making a new textbook available for free. The Wikimedia foundation has set up a platform for creating textbooks online.

So, how much does this cost? Yes, it's true – nothing of this sort is ever truly free. From July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010, it cost about \$10 million to run Wikipedia. One might argue, that at 3.6 million articles, the volume of information in Wikipedia would be similar to, or at least on the same order of magnitude of all commonly used textbooks combined. If it may take a few tens of millions of dollars per year for students to have access to all their textbooks, with the added benefit of all that information being available to EVERYONE, why should students need to continue to pay ten billion?



Meet Songwriter and Musician, Jens Jeppesen!

On Friday night of the Charlottetown East Coast Music Awards, Jens Jeppesen had been up late playing his music. The last thing he had expected was a Saturday morning call from the Deep Roots Music Cooperative, because he was in a "Deep" sleep (quite a coincidence). Although barely awake, in a very congenial way, Jens Jeppesen allowed an interview to begin almost immediately, knowing an audience is looking forward to seeing him perform Saturday May 28th with fellow award-winners Matt Anderson and The Hupman Brothers Band, at Acadia University Hall in Wolfville. Jens received 2010 nominations and won an award from Music New Brunswick.

DEEP ROOTS: What is the "Newgrass" style you've been said to play? **JENS JEPPESEN:** It combines fiddle music with bluegrass, breathing life into old Appalachian Mountain music to make it more palatable. A lot of people don't like bluegrass's nasal tones and harsh-sounding midrange instruments, and turn up their noses. So I try to put my own life into the style, to bring to the table something people will enjoy. And they love it—when it's played with modern instruments, a modern sound, and not out-of-tune. Bluegrass is really technical: I love the stuff, and want to share it — with more of life in it and with a different take. I make it my own, so that people can enjoy it.

DEEP ROOTS: Before we finish —are you encouraged by what's happening in today's music industry?

JENS: Maritime music is growing, and whether it's country, folk, bluegrass, blues, or rock, the next great artist is going to be from the Maritimes. We have talent that is out of this world. With The Allman Brothers playing the Harvest Jazz Festival —the Hupman Brothers could do equally as good a job. The Divorcees` music is old-time, but new —and incredible.

West Coast Canada has lots of great artists, like Corb Lund and Tim Hus. Great music is everywhere, -- but we have a concentrated amount of talent right here!
