

### ROBERT RUTHERFORD SHOW AT HARVEST GALLERY

*Wolfville, NS – July 26<sup>th</sup>, 2011* "Travelling around in fine weather is a Nova Scotian adventure. The time of day or tide changes the look of a place. An hours' drive can put you in a different kind of geography. A hundred million years ago, Nova Scotia hugged Europe and Africa, keeping souvenirs of each."

Several times each year, Rutherford packs his BMW motorcycle with camping gear and explores part of Atlantic Canada. When a good subject shows up, he finds a quiet hill and draws for two or three hours. No photograph. The

image is translated in the oldest, most direct language of symbols.

Robert Rutherford has spent the past twenty years developing his distinctive style of Maritime images. He works select drawings into serigraphs. The serigraph (or silkscreen) process has evolved from an ancient Japanese stencil technique. The stencil consists of a block-out (or resist) painted on stretched fabric called the screen. Ink is pulled across the screen with a squeegee. The ink passes through the fabric (except where the stencil block out has

been applied) and onto the



paper beneath. Rutherford's interest in art began at Trinity College School, while under the instruction of David Blackwood. He was awarded scholarships to study at the Banff School of Fine Arts and the Ontario College of Art and Design where he studied printmaking with Frederick Hagen. He spent a year in France, studying at L'Ecole des Beaux Arts d'Avignon.



# Mona Parsons, Con't

Editor's Note: We continue with Mona's tale of bravery and courage. Petitions to rename Clock Park after her are located around Wolfville: United Church (329 Main St.), T.A.N. Coffee Wolfville and others.

In March 1945, the 44-year old Mona escaped a German concentration camp with a Dutch baroness, 22-year old Wendelien van Boetzelaer. For three weeks, the two women walked through the cold and wet, heading for Holland. Mona used her acting skills to pose as a mentally challenged woman with a cleft palate (to avoid speaking Canadian-accented German), while Wendelien used her linguistic skills and intimate knowledge of Germany to parlay their way out of some tight spots. They exchanged labour for food and lodging, and eventually made their way to Rhede, on the Dutch/German border. There they were separated as they approached the allied forces.

Mona identified herself as Canadian. One soldier regarded the filthy, begraggled Mona who, at 5' 8" now weighed only 87 pounds and asked suspiciously,

if she was from Canada, where was she from? Mustering all the dignity possible, she replied, "I'm from a small town in Nova Scotia, called Wolfville." He swore softly and said, "I'm Clarence Leonard, and I'm from Halifax -- and we are the North Nova Scotia Highlanders."

But even so, they could not take her at her word. She was taken to a field hospital, where she was given food and a medical examination, but where she would also be questioned by Canadian Army Intelligence. The doctor who treated her at the field hospital was Capt. Kelly McLean. The two had acted together at Acadia University. Not only could he vouch for her identity, he found two other officers who would offer their support. One was Capt. Vincent White, whose cousin lived across the street from the Parsons when they'd lived on Acadia Street. The other was Capt. Robbins Elliott, the son of the Parsons' family physician in Wolfville. For her bravery in helping Allied servicemen evade enemy capture, Mona received citations from Air Chief Marshall Lord Arthur Tedder of the Royal Air Force, and General Dwight Eisenhower, Commanding General of the American Forces in Europe. Canada made no such recognition.

popular vines of the 18 acres planted such as Marechal Foch, Leon Millot, Muscat and L'Acadie. However she got really excited when she started talking about her favourite vine to work with - the Geisenhiem, a grape very similar to the Reisling. It's a more delicate type that needs tender loving care as it's prone to mildew, but Devon is up for the challenge. She was also happy to talk about two other varietals new to the area – Petite Milo and Drops of Amber. Petite Milo is a white grape that ripens early, has high sugar levels while retaining good acidity - perfect for the Nova Scotia wine industry! It makes a great Reisling-styled wine with honey tones.

I met Lorraine back at the winery where she must have sensed my need and quickly offered me a glass of wine – Avondale Sky's version of Tidal Bay! A beautiful blend of 15% Geisenhiem and 85% L'Acadie Blanc (some estate grapes that had been barrel fermented and some from a grower on the South Shore) that was delightfully citrusy but also had a lovely and long mineral finish. Just what I needed!

There was just one last thing to see - the inside of the church that will become the tasting room and retail shop. The high vaulted ceiling was still the original wood in simple yet elegant diagonal design and in fact, every bit of wood was the original from the wainscoting to the crown molding. It will be a stunning and elegant place to taste Nova Scotia's newest wines. The opening date is still to be determined but I promise to let you know as soon as I hear when the big day will be!!



# **Professor's Perspective:**

## Acadia International Executive Insight Series (AIEIS)

ow can we use electronic and web based technologies to improve the learning experiences of our students? Seeking answers to this question has driven much of my intellectual activity for the last 15 years. I teach Business Strategy to undergraduate students at Acadia University. Most of these students have had opportunities to study elsewhere but have chosen Acadia. My task is to help them learn more about my discipline but do so without being in close proximity to the head offices of many large corporate entities. As opposed to schools such as McGill, the University of Toronto, UBC or the University of Calgary, skyscrapers with commercial tenants are a long way off for our students. Fortunately, the internet has turned out to be the great equalizer.

The Acadia Advantage program of the late 90's and early years of the past decade positioned many of us quite well for teaching in the digital era. It fostered a culture of creativity, a desire to innovate. One innovation that is now in its seventh year of development is the Acadia International Executive Insight

Series (AIEIS). Created by a team of individuals, in its current form it is a collection of over 300 video interviews of executives, managers and entrepreneurs that are broken down into approximately 6000 transcribed and key word tagged video clips. All of these videos are hosted on the web in a searchable custom database designed and developed at Acadia University. Filmed in nine countries and over one hundred industries, the interviews form the basis of a series of teaching applications.

Courses about Business and Corporate Strategy are a staple offering of management programs around the world. One feature that these courses have in common is that they seek to help students understand why companies, both large and small, behave or act as they do. Traditionally, tools for communicating these insights have included textbooks, Harvard Style teaching cases, in class lectures using MS Powerpoint slides, guest lecturers and in-class exercises. In recent years added to these have been online databases that host financial documents, business news stories or videos.

In this regard, the websites of U.S. Securities and Exchange Commissions, Biz. Yahoo! and Reuters are some examples that come to mind. These are all important sources of insight. However, sometimes it is even more compelling to learn about issues and ideas from actual managers, executives and entrepreneurs.

How do we use the video collection? For example, the AIEIS collection enables Acadia students to learn about business models playing out in the local fruiting growing industry, challenges being faced by owners and wine makers in our nascent regional wine industry, the experiences of Nova Scotia based business owners operating in the offshore oil and gas industry and insights about typical workdays of executives living in Halifax but employed by national and multinational companies operating in the Maritimes. If asked to assess risks of opening business offices around the world, subtle insight can be gained by listening and watching how managers in locations as varied as New York, The Bahamas, Bermuda, Japan, Hong Kong,



North Ireland and Australia explain how they overcome hurdles and pursue opportunities.

We have captured a wealth of insight over the last few years. A good portion of this insight originates with Nova Scotians who live close by. Our challenge is to continue the development of our web hosting platform and our content to meet the changing ways by which digital information is being accessed now and into the future be it through an Iphone, an Ipad, a laptop computer or other means. Fortunately, a number of sponsor organizations believe that we are onto something here and have supported our endeavours over the last few years. Grapevine permitting, that will be the subject of a follow up article.



# Market Greens and Raspberries

ale and Swiss Chard are among the most beautiful of vegetables. Sold in enormous bunches, and in a multitude of gorgeous colours, these greens practically jump into your market bag (they do look stylish, jauntily peeking out of there). It's only when you get home that

you go "uh-oh! What was I thinking, buying this many greens?" Well, if you are crazy healthy, you put them in a smoothie and head back the next week for more. However, the rest of us may want to dress it up a little, or at least cook it. Luckily, it's easy.

#### **Greens with Caramelized Onions**

- 1 T. Olive Oil
- 1 large Onion, sliced or diced
- 2 Cloves Garlic, minced
- 1 bunch Swiss Chard or Kale, chopped (stems are most welcome, but separate them from the leaves and chop them)
- Salt and Pepper
- · Optional: Balsamic Vinegar, Raisins, Dried Cherries, Feta, Parmesan Cheese



Heat your largest pan over medium heat and add the olive oil and onions. Stir and cook for at least ten minutes, until onions have softened and are browned in spots. You may add a little water from time to time if the onions are sticking. Turn the heat to high and stir in the garlic and stems. Saute for a minute. If you're using kale, add the chopped leaves at this point and about 1/4 C. water. Cover and cook for about five minutes, until kale is tender. If using Swiss Chard, the water isn't necessary. Just add the leaves and stir until wilted. In either case, season to taste with salt and pepper. If you like, add a sprinkle of balsamic vinegar, and/or a small amount of any or all of the suggested toppings!

## Chicken Penne with Raspberries and Greens

- 1 batch Greens with Caramelized Onions
- 1 C. Whipping Cream
- 1/2 C. Apple Cider (optional, I love Boates)
- 1 lb. Penne or your favourite pasta, cooked
- 2 C. cooked chicken, diced or shredded
- 1 pint Raspberries
- Freshly Grated Parmesan Cheese and Chopped Parsley

Prepare the greens in your largest pan, then stir in the cream and cider if using. Bring to a boil over medium high heat and let bubble for a minute. Stir in the pasta and chicken. Cover and cook for about five

minutes, until sauce has thickened and pasta is nicely coated. Season to taste with salt and pepper, and divide among 6 bowls. Garnish with the raspberries and sprinkle with the parmesan cheese and parsley.



## WHO'S WHO - DEWEY DUNNINGTON: Why DEWEY like him so much?

o-hosting Open Mike and Donna at TAN coffee in Wolfville on Tuesday evenings enables me to meet many wonderful and talented people. I have encountered musicians who've lived in Wolfville for years and also those who are just passing through or staying for a short period of time and I feel privileged each week to listen to their music and then sit and chat with them. That's how I met Dewey Dunnington. And here he is.

Dewey William Dunnington (yes, that's his real name!) was born and raised in Middlebury, Vermont, a small college town about an hour south of Burlington and after seeing the Hupman Brothers perform at a Paddy's Pub Open Mic, during a visit to Wolfville, Dewey chose Acadia to further his studies and Wolfville has been his home for the last few years. As much as Dewey says the pretty mountains, clear air, nice people and the Vermontesque look of Nova Scotia were his draw to the area,

I'll spill the beans here: It was the Paddy's Beer!

Currently, Dewey is completing his degree in Environmental Science at Acadia, taking a little extra time (he's in year four and a half) to complete his honors thesis, which is looking at human induced change in a small shallow marsh lake near Amherst. I hope he doesn't get too bogged down with his work!

In the past Dewey has worked doing trail maintenance in Vermont, taking care of the Morton Centre (Acadia's field station in Lunenburg) and now he gets paid to do research. Dewey loves to be outside, his woodsy appearance gives it away a bit, and he feels lucky to have found a job that puts him among the elements and a program that lets him learn about the world around him. Mr. Dunnington loves to canoe and climb things and most importantly (for me and his audience) Dewey loves playing music. Whether it's at

the Wolfville Farmer's Market, Paddy's Pub, Open Mike and Donna, or New Zealand, where he was playing four open mics a week last year, Dewey is a great entertainer who plays from the heart. One of the reasons Dewey will find it hard to leave Wolfville one day is because of the music stating "There's free music 3-5 nights a week depending on the time of year, and open mics for 3-4 of those depending how far you're willing to drive". For me, it's all about the passion and when you watch Dewey play there is an immense visible passion in what he's doing.

This passion transcends into his love of the environment. Dewey joined the Environmental Society at Acadia in his first year and took it over during his second with great results. The year after that he took on the Community Farm during the spring, as well as the Dump and Run. He also ran the AES Coffeehouse for the last two years and he also did a Sunday night radio show on



local music during the school year when Axe Radio was up and running. Fingers are crossed by anyone who knows Dewey that his path will lead him to a paying job that keeps him outside and allows him to live in a town where he can share his music with the residents. So, why DEWEY love him so much? Because he's good with a guitar, he's good for the environment, he's been good for Wolfville and he's just plain good!

#### Heard it Through the Grapevine: The Mellotones at Muir Murray Winery

he Mellotones, one of Halifax's most popular dance bands, performed a fantastic show at Muir Murray Winery on Saturday July 16th. The Mellotones can usually be found at the Sea Horse Tavern downtown Halifax on Thursday nights, where they play sets of funk, jazz and blues, covering artists like Al Green, Van Morrison, Booker T and the MG's, Bob Marley, James Brown, Kool and the Gang, and the Bar-Kays. On Saturday night, the ninepiece ensemble took over Muir Murray's marquee and played three full sets late into the night.

The small but energetic crowd was up and dancing on a makeshift dance floor a few seconds into the first song. Although Muir Murray created a relaxed atmosphere by lining up tables in front of the stage, it unfortunately did not

provide enough dancing space. It was almost impossible to stay seated as lead singer Jeffery Mosher and his four-piece horn section played funky breakdowns. However, the lack of dancing space was made up for by the winery's prime location. If you weren't feeling like busting a move on the dance floor, you could take a stroll in the winery's green fields overlooking the beautiful Cape Blomidon and the Minas Basin.

The three sets became gradually more fast-paced, and by the end of the night, almost everyone was up front dancing. The atmosphere was fun, and relaxed. The Mellotones ended the night with a great cover of Marvin Gaye's "Let's Get It On."

The event was advertised on Groupon, a deal-of-the-day

type of website that features discounted gift certificates redeemable at local (or national) companies or events. This groupon advertised the Mellotones concert at half price (\$10 instead of \$20) or two tickets for \$18. A complementary glass of wine and a free one-year wine-club membership were also included in the deal. According to the website, 48 Groupons were purchased.

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#### Don't Forget the Small Stuff


iving in rural Nova Scotia compared to the metropolis that I haled from seven years ago, I've noticed that there is definitely a different way of community spirit (ya think!).
