PAPILIO TO PLAY AT EVERGREEN THEATRE

HE NEXT OFFERING at the Evergreen Theatre in East Margaretsville is an emerging Celtic group from Halifax, whose members have some pretty impressive musical chops. The concert is on Saturday August 21 and reservations/tickets can be obtained online at www.evergreentheatre.ca, or at evergreentheatre@gmail.com or 902-825-

Papilio, a neo-traditional band from Nova Scotia, captures the spirit and drive of traditional Celtic, Folk, Nordic, and World music while giving it a new, contemporary, creative twist that is all their own. More than a Ceilidh band, they are a progressive neo-traditional trio that invites the listener on an auditory journey through Ireland, Scotland, the Maritimes, Brittany (the Celtic region of France), Galicia/Asturia (Celtic regions of Spain), Scandinavia, Eastern Europe, and beyond, adding a sprinkle of folk ballads and their own "in-the-tradition" original

compositions.

Colin Jeffrey (fiddle) grew up in the United States and on Prince Edward Island playing Classical and Celtic music on the violin. His interest in music took him to Memorial University



of Newfoundland where he completed his Bachelor degree in music performance.

Jennifer Publicover (flutes, bodhrán) leads a double life as an active freelancer on both the modern orchestral flute and wooden Irish flute, and makes full use of both instruments in Papilio. She is also a member of the neo-celtic band Fancy's Flight. A familiar face at Halifax sessions, she has been a long-time participant in and supporter of the Boxwood Festival, an annual traditional flute workshop in Lunenburg directed by recording artist Chris Norman. In her alter

ego as a classical flutist, she performs as an alternate player for such institutions as the Charlottetown Festival Orchestra and Symphony Nova Scotia.

Phil Schappert (guitar, cittern, vocals) has been playing for more years than he can remember. Dr. Phil, as his students know him, is also a PhD

entomologist/botanist who has written books about plant/insect interactions (FYI, Papilio is a genus of swallowtail butterflies, represented in Nova Scotia by Papilio Canadensis, the Canadian Tiger Swallowtail). Phil is also a member of the band Fancy's Flight.

PARK IT AT THE PORT

My name is Lia and I have a feelgood story for you. I live in Port Williams having moved here from Toronto five years ago. PW is a great place to live and now its even better because of our new park.

The park, which was just something a lot of parents talked about doing, is now a reality. To see people arriving from sun up to sun down by foot, bike or by car is a dream come true. And it's not just a place for Port residents, we also have people visiting the park from many other communities. They tell us, "we love this park!" And we love hearing that.

In two years' time we have raised money and built: a parking lot, a hard surface court for basketball and ball hockey, a walking trail, and my favourite because it keeps my boys busy - a great play structure with FIVE amazing slides! We are getting ready to build a park pavilion next. That work will be done by Wise Owl Joinery, located in Port Williams.

We have gone local as much as

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possible in terms of hiring people to work on the park. And not enough can be said about this amazing community (and those around us) who have really dug in their heels and helped out either by providing labour at no cost, lending machinery, baking for an event, or giving their time to make an event happen.

With grants and fundraisers (we ran 12 in 2009) we have raised approximately \$140,000! We are now in the home stretch.

The biggest blockbuster of the fall season is back again with Park It at the Port - The Sequel. Last year, our goal to raise \$10K for Play was SMASHED to bits as we raised more than \$20K in one night! This year's Park It at the Port will take place on Saturday, September 18th at the Port Pub. The money raised from this event will go towards the park pavilion and if there is anything left over, we will put it away for maintenance needs. Parks are expensive.

We have Jon Duggan to entertain





the guests, appetizers, door prizes and some amazing silent/ live auction items. Last year this event sold out. This year, the Port Pub has opened up the entire restaurant for this event. We hope to sell 150 tickets.

As mentioned, we are in the home stretch. We hope this will be *the last* fundraiser we need.





It's magic, I tell you! So, I recommend those who don't have a candy thermometer, go out and get one! It's like a magic wand. You'll be like Harry Potter in the kitchen. Frozen Grand Marnier Soufflés

- 1 cup caster (superfine) sugar
- 6 large eggs, separated
- 1 cup milk
- ½ ounce powdered, unflavoured gelatine, soaked in 3 TBSP cold water
- 3 TBSP water
- 1 ¾ cup heavy cream
- 4 TBSP Grand Marnier

Tie a double collar of waxed or parchment paper around 8 ramekins. Make sure it extends about an inch above the rim. Secure with elastic bands, if you like. Put 6 TBSP of the sugar in a bowl with 6 egg yolks and whisk until pale.

Heat the milk until almost boiling and slowly pour it onto the yolks, whisking the whole time. Return the mixture to the pan and stir over a gentle heat until it gets thick enough to coat the back of a spoon.

.....

Remove the pan from the heat and stir in the soaked gelatine. Pour into bowl and leave to cool. Whisk occasionally, until it is on the point of setting.

Put the remaining sugar in a pan with the water and dissolve it over low heat. Bring to a rapid boil until the candy thermometer reads 119°C/238°F. Remove from heat.

In a clean, dry bowl, whisk the egg whites until stiff. Pour the hot syrup onto the egg whites, with the beater still going, until thoroughly combined, set aside and cool.

Whisk the cream until it holds soft peaks. This means it will look like melting marshmallows on a campfire (yum!). Add the Grand Marnier to the cold custard and fold gently into the meringue mixture (you want as much air as possible in your mixture; it's what makes it so fluffy and light). Fold in the whipped cream. Quickly pour into the waiting ramekins and freeze overnight. Remove the paper before serving with orange slices or chocolate anything!





Minas may be looking for a new home. Owners Frieda and Gerd Burger have decided it's time to take things a little easier. They've sold the building and the Enviro-Depot recycling division although not the business itself.

"We don't know yet what will happen to the boot," Frieda says. "The future of the store is undetermined at this time."

The tentative closing date is September $30^{\rm th}$, with a closing-out sale starting in August.

Many local people have grown up with the boot, using it to get their bearings since childhood. Justin Flemming, manager of Andy's Tire Shop in New Minas, remembers car trips with his parents to visit family in Kentville. "As a kid I always wanted to know, 'Are we there yet?' But instead I'd ask my dad, 'Are we at the boot yet?' I knew that once I saw the boot, we were nearly there."
