JENNY MACDONALD SINGS, "Bye Bye, Mr. Bluesman"

ALBUM PREVIEW

In a room lined with sweaty bodies, noise, and smoke, appears the tiny silhouette of a delicate looking young woman seemingly no match for the rugged crowd. She opens her mouth; the room goes silent.

lthough new to the Annapolis Valley region, Jenny MacDonald is no stranger to the stage. Releasing her debut album, "Jenny Kissed Me" in 2008, MacDonald has since performed alongside a number of Canada's favorite artists including; Gordie Sampson, Charlie A'Court, Ian Sherwood, Coco Love Alcorn, and Christina Martin, and has become a favorite among CBC listeners.

MacDonald's upcoming release, "Bye Bye, Mr. Bluesman", weaves through stories of 'hellos', 'goodbyes', frustrations, and butterflies in a unique mix of blues and 20s-inspired swing - with a mix of country and folk sprinkled on top.

Jenny explains that she has been writing these songs since her first release in 2008, and fifteen tracks

were chosen out of "probably hundreds" of original compositions. The title track, "Bye Bye, Mr. Bluesman" was written somewhere in the middle of those years, and was chosen as the title to offer the listeners an idea of what they can find on the album, both in genre and content.

"This is the first time I went into

"I really love working with Scott [Hupman]. He believes in making honest music, which is one of the reasons I wanted to work with him. Music should sound like real people playing real instruments... You can put all the notes and words and rhythms together, but it's passion that makes good music and connects people."

RICHARD HENNIGAR'S HURRICANE REPORT

Richard Hennigar makes some really good, addicting apple cider. His friendly smiles and free samples at the Wolfville Farmers'Market are enough to turn most people into habitual drinkers of the stuff (it's non alcoholic btw). When I heard about the possible destruction of Hurricane Earl, my immediate concerns went out to him and all the other fruit producers in the area.

My roommate Rick, who works

with Richard, mentioned that they had been diligently picking the more at-risk orchards in an attempt to lessen the drops. "The morning it hit I was actually more preoccupied with getting things ready for the Saturday Storm Mini-Market", Richard recalled. "I heard that it made a turn to the East at the last minute and that saved us. We're quite susceptible right now as the weight of the mature apples would have broken a lot of limbs had the storm come right up the Bay of Fundy. We

really dodged a bullet". As far as Richard has heard, Earl essentially did no serious damage.

Richard has lived in Sheffield Mills for most of his life and apples have been in his family for 3 generations (since 1905). He grows 4 major scab resistant varieties which are crossed with crab apples which is conducive to his no spray, no pesticides and no fungicide approach. He also has a unique, extremely costeffective method to do field grass maintenance - grass bending. Bend it once in late July and the new grass won't grow high enough to interfere. YouTube search it.

His 25-acre Suprima Farms is striving to become a zeroemission apple operation..until it's time to physically move them out of the orchard. Thanks for the update Richard.

INNER SUN YOGA CENTRE

Tucked into the eastern corner on the second floor of the gray building at 112 Front Street is Inner Sun Yoga Centre. The space is beautiful. AUFA and BoG Reach Agreement Story also found in the Sept 1st issue of the ATHENAEUM

A fter a summer of negotiations, Acadia's Faculty Union (AUFA) and the Board of Governors have ratified a four-year collective agreement, which will cover the period between July 1st, 2010 and June 30th 2014. Negotiations began on May 3rd, 2010.

This four-year contract prevents the possibility of collective action during the incoming class' four years at Acadia. The graduating class of 2011 is also relieved that the possibility of a second strike is null with the new agreement. "After going through a strike during my stay, it is great to see Acadia sailing clearly through these negotiations. This is the kind of stability that Acadia needs for going forward," Amy Buckland-Nicks, a fourth-year student said.

However, some feel the most recent possibility of a strike should never have arisen. "My opinion is that the agreement should have already taken place. I think it should just be a general rule that there should be a four-year cool-down period for undergraduate schools after a strike where they cannot take collective action again for another four years," Andrew Morton, a fourth-year student said.

In the summer and fall of 2007, AUFA and the Board of Governors were unable to reach an agreement, resulting in a strike that lasted about three weeks - from October 15th until November 5th. A mediator was called in to help with final negotiations. Although the most recent collective bargaining period was under a media blackout, the negotiations were quick and successful.

In a press release by Acadia University, the chair of Acadia's Board of Governors commended both sides on reaching a speedy consensus. "I want to congratulate members of the negotiating teams for demonstrating their commitment to Acadia by reaching an agreement in advance

of the upcoming school year through determined collective bargaining," Jewer said.
AUFA and the Board of Governors were able to agree on a number of "post 65 benefits." For example, the age to receive benefit coverage has been increased to the age of 76, and long-term disability coverage has been increased until the age of 70. AUFA represents full-time faculty members, librarians and instructors, and part-time faculty members.



- Cinnamon

Directions:

Choose fruits that are in season and wash, slice or chop, and combine in a bowl.

For about 2 1/2 cups of dip, combine plain or vanilla yogurt with orange juice. Add honey and cinnamon to taste — usually about 2 tablespoons of honey and 1 teaspoon of cinnamon. The dip can be made the day before.

- Graham cracker crumbs






