

Should Governments Support Wikipedia?

On January 18, Wikipedia staged a service blackout to raise awareness about SOPA. We have become so dependent on Wikipedia for information that few people did not encounter the blackout message. This dependence brings to mind another Wikipedia notice we see frequently - the donation request.

Over their 2010-2011 fiscal year, Wikipedia cost \$17.9 million to run. They managed this year to make more than that in donations; however, I would argue that governments should provide donations or at least insure against donation shortfalls. If we use this resource so heavily, then surely our governments should help ensure its ongoing existence.

One problem with justifying funding for Wikipedia is the same for almost any public good - what is its value? That is a very problematic question to answer.

On the surface, one might estimate its value as the cost of providing a high quality, complete

encyclopedia to all people with access to Wikipedia. The Encyclopedia Britannica costs \$1395 USD for a full set. If we estimate using only the population of the US and Canada, we get a value of \$479 billion.

That's a great return on investment, isn't it?

But this number is a little absurd. First, it assumes everybody is willing and able to pay \$1395 for the resource. How many lowincome families could afford \$1395 for a set of encyclopedias? How many others would choose to?

Second, it assumes that how much people are willing to pay for something is also the value they find in having it. A diamond has little use, but is very expensive. Water is essential to life, but one would not pay high prices for it. \$1395 is an amount enough people are willing to pay to return a sufficiently high level of profit for the company. It is not an actual representation of the usefulness of the product.

So, it comes down to cost and benefit. To place an up-todate encyclopedia in all public libraries in Canada and the US, it would cost \$27.7 million per year. To place a copy in everyone's hands would be \$479 billion.

Governments should help Wikipedia by insuring its shortfalls. At some small portion of \$17.9 million, it would cost far less than the other options, and would have more content and accessibility. In the meantime, if you can easily afford to, donate and help everyone continue to have access to this valuable resource.


Investing: Shares (\$100 each) in the FarmWorks CEDIF will be invested in farms and food production. Investments are eligible for a 35% Nova Scotia non-refundable Equity Tax Credit (may be carried forwards 7 years and backward 3 years) and for RRSP tax deferral. 
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

(Windsor, NS) Mermaid Imperial Performing Arts Centre, in conjunction with the Annapolis Valley Regional School Board's AVID Series, will be hosting a screening of the powerful and profound documentary film *Prom Night in Mississippi* followed by a discussion led by the film's director Paul Saltzman on **Wednesday, February 8 at 7:00pm**. Admission is free to all members of the public within the AVRSB.

Saltzman's visit is part of the Annapolis Valley Regional School Board's Annapolis Valley Initiatives in Diversity (AVID) Series, which features guest lectures and presentations on Race Relations, Cross Cultural Understanding, and Human Rights (RCH) related issues. The AVID Series creates tools for inspiration, reflection and action by offering opportunities to engage with diversity issues in a meaningful and challenging way.

The film follows the 2008 effort, led by actor Morgan Freeman, to bring the first non-segregated prom to the high school students of Charleston, Mississippi, Freeman's hometown. In 1997, he offered to pay for the prom if both black and white students could attend, but the offer was declined. In 2008 he tried again and the offer was at last accepted. The resulting film follows a group of young people who defy old prejudices and successfully stand up for their core values of diversity and inclusion.

Director Paul Saltzman founded an organization called "Moving Beyond Prejudice," whose mission is to "directly and positively impact the attitudes, beliefs and prejudices of students, youth-atrisk and adults" by using the film as a starting point. The director has facilitated the post-film discussions at screenings around the country with powerful results.



The "Brown Bag Lunch" first began as an Acadia Lifelong Learning program about four years ago. It is held on Thursdays at noon during the fall and winter terms, its current location being the Alumni Board Room on the 2nd floor of the Fountain Commons on the Acadia campus. The 24 talks presented each academic year feature a wide variety of topics purposely designed to appeal to a diverse range of interests. Each session begins with the guest speaker discussing (and often illustrating with slides) their subject and ends with a 15 minute Q & A encouraging active audience participation.

While those who come are expected to be members of Acadia Lifelong Learning (a \$25 per year annual fee gains this status) and 50 years of age or over, there are no iris scans done to block the casual observer interested in a specific topic! Most of the courses offered through Open Acadia --- of which A. L. L. is a subsidiary --- feature one instructor providing between 3 and 6 classes on the same topic. In contrast, Brown Bag Lunch is intentionally more eclectic, but a different topic each week results in less opportunity to explore a topic in detail.

D ave Sheehan is Acadia University's video producer. His video studio is located in the Vaughan Memorial Library and is operated by the Communications and Marketing department.

For more than two decades, the studio has produced content to support faculty project development, in both classroom and research activities, as well as create promotional, recruiting, and fundraising materials for the university. Over the years, thousands of hours of video content has been recorded and produced.

"While we are producing programming that is relevant today we are recording individuals, development, and progress on campus for future generations." says Sheehan, "almost as a byproduct, we are creating the Acadia archives of tomorrow."

Over the years, innovative projects such as The Acadia International Executive Speaker Series, Virtual Learning Environments, MusicPath, and many others have been produced' projects totalling well over a million dollars in external funding and grants. Many of the projects involved private sector partnerships and knowledge transfer.

One of the popular on-going projects is AcadiaTV (acadiatv.acadiau.ca). AcadiaTV informs and builds community both on campus and beyond. Co-Produced with colleague Sherri Turner, AcadiaTV is distributed to prospective students and alumni, promoting the diverse activities on campus to a broad audience. The AcadiaTV site has been viewed nearly 250,000 times in the last two years and has won two national awards.

The Acadia International Executive Speaker Series is a partnership with Dr. Conor Vibert of the Manning School of Business Administration. Nearly 400 interviews have been conducted in more than 12 countries during the last seven years. The video database now contains nearly 8,000 sortable, searchable video clips and transcripts. Partnerships with Dell Computer, Deloitte, the Atlantic Gateway, UPEI and Curtin University in Perth, Australia have allowed the Acadia team to create international content in all fields of business.

"Acadia retains rights and use of the content so our students benefit directly, while we generate revenue for the university through these partnerships," explains Sheehan.



A recent project with Dr. Jonathon Fowles is being adopted nationally by the Canadian Diabetes Association. It's an exercise toolkit to promote active living for people with diabetes.

"It's nice to think that your work is having an impact on people, whether it's sharing ways to improve health issues or to preserve Inuit traditional knowledge," says Sheehan.

As a long time resident of the Valley, Sheehan continues to be involved in a number of organizations and groups. A volunteer youth soccer coach for more than 15 years, and a former assistant coach with the Axemen, Sheehan continues to coach at the Senior Men's level which supports the Axemen by training the varsity players during the off season. Along with Michael Bawtree, Sheehan's son Dylan, Axemen Zach Shaffelburg, and others have formed a not-for-

profit society called Alive and Kicking SC to raise funds for an initiative that promotes soccer and healthy living in Africa. Money raised is sent to Africa where Africans are employed to make soccer balls for African youth. The balls include positive messages about health issues such as AIDS and TB. Dave has also participated with local environmental groups and community efforts.

"As a video producer, I've had the chance to work with a number of local groups, such as, ATF, Deep Roots, WOW, EKCC, AVH and others. I've also had the good fortune to work with and meet people like Jim Henson, Alex Colville, celebrities, artists, royalty and heads of state." says Sheehan. "I joke, have camera will travel; and luckily I've worked from Nunavut to Australia, Europe to Asia, maybe 20 countries in total. It's a great part of the job." He says it's always nice to return home to his house on the lake where his wife Kelly and two children Dylan and Jessica have lived since 2000.

He continues, "We have a wonderful lifestyle here in the Valley; when I travel I often tell people that I drive 25 minutes to work and have only one traffic light. Of course, when you're in the middle of Tokyo or Hong Kong it's hard for people to believe."

In the coming months, both of Sheehan's married children will soon be bringing new grandchildren back to the lake to visit their grandfather and grandmother. Where did the time go?

"It's wonderful to have both of the kids and their spouses so close to home, and now they are both expecting. I've told them that Kelly and I will fill the grandkids with ice cream and sand and send them home." he says with a laugh.





Valley Mushrooms

Mushrooms. I used to find them unappealing, gross actually. And now I adore them, crave them, *dream* about them. This has happened with plenty of foods since I've grown up-eggplant and cilantro among them.

Luckily for me, a mushroom fix is always close by. Julia and Leonard North of Valley Mushrooms grow gorgeous Button, Cremini and Portabello mushrooms just down the road, and we've incorporated them into all kinds of dishes at the Cafe: a fabulous burger topped with Garlic Portabellos and Swiss Cheese, Spinach Salad with Button Mushrooms, Wicked Fries (our version of potato skins, with portabellos, bacon and green

Cream of Valley Mushroom Soup

1/3 C. Butter

1 lb. Mushrooms, sliced (a mix of white, cremini and portabello mushrooms are nice)

onions) and our ever-popular Cream of Mushroom Soup. At Christmastime, I was taken by a sign advertising oyster and shitake mushrooms for sale, an experiment that I hope Leonard repeats regularly! I sauteed them along with portabellos and garlic as part of our Christmas feast .. they were amazing.

Mushrooms are a rich source of tasty. Their mouthwatering deliciousness is partly due to the presence of glutamic acid. You've heard of the fifth taste, or umami? This refers to a savouriness, a meatiness, that is present in foods containing glutamic acid, the natural form of monosodium glutamate. Mushrooms have it, so

do tomatoes and dulse.

If you live in the Valley, choose Valley Mushrooms. Otherwise, the closest growers are in Ontario, and by the time their mushrooms get here, they are usually old and leggy (mushrooms keep growing in the box, their stems lengthening). You can buy Valley mushrooms at grocery stores, at the Wolfville Farmer's Market at Elena Basevich's Bakery stand (have a Pecan Cinnamon Bun for me, too) or at their retail outlet across from the Michelin plant in Waterville. Go ahead and stock up-mushrooms freeze very well once cooked!

Heat the butter in a heavy pot over medium high heat and add the onions and mushrooms. Stir and cook until mushrooms have released their liquid, then add the garlic. Continue to cook, stirring often, until liquid has evaporated and mushrooms are beginning to brown. Add the flour and cook another minute, then whisk in half the stock. When the mix is smooth, add the rest of the stock. Whisking fairly frequently to prevent lumps, bring the soup to a boil. Remove from the heat and add the cream, nutmeg, parsley and salt and pepper. Taste for seasoning.

HERBAL HELP FOR THE FEBRUARY BLAHS

Are you feeling it? Melancholic, low energy, & with a humdrum attitude for no particular reason? choices also play a huge role in our emotional health.

St. John's Wort: is one of the primary herbal anti-depressants. It is particularly effective in cases of Seasonal Affective Disorder (S.A.D.). It may take a bit of time to kick in so be patient. Also, be sure to avoid strong sun exposure while taking it & to ask a pharmacist about contraindications. In my experience with clients, this herb works best in an oil-based pill form.

Holy Basil (Tulsi): is one of the best adaptogen herbs, meaning it helps your body adapt to stress. It is also very uplifting & is an excellent immune booster (stressed & depressed people are generally more prone to catching colds & flus). Take as a tea or tincture.

Lemon Balm: is both calming & cheering at the same time. This herb is excellent for both adults & children & is very safe. A simple tea 1-3 times daily is my prescription.

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
The Fascination of Orchids

rchids form the second largest family of plants in the world, with 25,000 or more species and are found in all continents except Antarctica and in all sorts of growing conditions from mountain tops to bogs. Many are terrestrial, and these are represented in both tropical and temperate regions. There are many terrestrial orchids in Nova Scotia, including the pink, yellow and showy lady slippers. Many more are epiphytic, growing on trees, and these are found only in tropical zones. One of these is the vanilla orchid whose seed pods produce the flavouring agent. Many tropicals can be grown as "houseplants" such as Phalaenopsis, the "moth orchid" sold in supermarkets, and Cattleyas which are often used in corsages. Many different tropical orchids are grown around the world in greenhouses, sun porches, windowsills and under artificial lights. The variety of shapes, sizes, colours and textures of the flowers offer delight and fascination to all who see them. It is easy to become an enthusiastic grower.

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The variety of orchids grown ensures that different kinds will bloom at various times of the year. In North America, orchid society shows are staggered throughout the year to showcase different blooming plants. A few years ago, with the encouragement of the Orchid Society of Nova Scotia (OSNS), a small group of orchid growers in the Valley decided to share their beautiful blooms with the community, and this yearly one day event has been held in the Conservatory of the K.C. Irving Centre at Acadia University each February. Several members of the OSNS from Halifax and the South Shore also participate in this show. A larger two day show is held by the OSNS annually in Halifax in early spring.

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
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t my workshop the other A night one of my "wonderful clients" told me this story.
