'ADAPT' AT ARTIST'S LANDING, **AVONDALE HERITAGE MUSEUM**

Last year I realized that I'd been inadvertently working on a series of maps of the Avon River, the Minas Basin, and the Bay of Fundy, some of which became the series "Within Every Fibre" (2016), "What We Leave Behind" (2017) and "Options" (2018). With these felted maps I was exploring the scars left on the landscape by the hands of man; a record of the environment adapting in response to manipulations made by man (the causeway, dykes, gypsum mines, roads, and rails).

Currently in the Avon region there has been much discussion regarding the twinning of Highway 101 along the Windsor Causeway and how to resolve some of the environmental issues that were created by the initial construction 50 years ago. The lack of proper fish passage has greatly restricted migration for spawning endangered wild Atlantic salmon, and the constricted tidal flow has led to a massive build-up of silt throughout the Avon River, extending as far as Hantsport, leading to erosion along the shoreline of the Avon and the other rivers that feed into it, like the St. Croix and Kennetcook.

As a result the mudflats, which historically would only be visible at low tide, continue to increase in mass regularly with each flood tide. When keeping a keen eye on the daily movements of the river, subtle changes can go unnoticed. After a three month lapse away from view, the build-up is unmistakable.

After a number of years of watching the girth of the mudflats increase from season to season, I gradually came to appreciate that I was witnessing the rebirth of a salt marsh within the river. Its ever-increasing presence wasn't necessarily something to fear, but rather something to embrace, accepting the role it plays in supporting a diverse variety of life, and that it may serve an important roll in protecting our little corner of the planet as we enter this era of climate crisis.

Prior to 1604 salt marshes were extensive throughout the upper Bay of Fundy, but 80% of these were lost as a result of dykeing by the Acadians. When the Windsor Causeway was constructed it disrupted the natural tidal prism and within a number of years a saltwater marsh was well on its way to establishing itself. It has been reported that the marshland is growing at a rate of 2 hectares a year. To date there seems to be very little discussion relating to the rapidly increasing and productive saltwater marsh that is gradually

expanding to fill the river, exacerbating erosion and impacting many residents and landowners along the shoreline of the river as it feeds into the Minas Basin.

With my position at the museum being seasonal, throughout the colder months I rarely get to experience daily life on the Avon River as I visit the community less frequently. Each spring when I return to work I find that I'm taken aback by how, within a few short months, the surrounding landscape has been so drastically altered. Mudflats continue to rise while the shoreline collapses. Hints of green spartina make themselves known, off in the distance, providing the first hint of what to expect next.

Over the past year I have created a series of maps depicting the ecological changes that have taken place in the area surrounding the site of the causeway over the last few centuries due to the hands of man. Inspired by historical references and existing maps and photographs, I have rendered in fibre what the upper bay of Fundy and Avon region looked like when first colonized, how it has continued to morph drastically throughout the last century, and what to expect in the near future as tides continue to rise and saltwater marshes reestablish along the Avon.

I will be exhibiting my entire collection of maps created over the last several years in a pop-up showcase entitled ADAPT, on display at Artists Landing Gallery, located in the upper level of the Avon River Heritage Museum, September 27-29, as a part of Culture Days.



DEEP ROOTS SPOTLIGHT

KIM BARLOW INTERVIEWS CATHERINE **MACLELLAN**

On opening night of the Deep Roots festival, celebrated Maritime singer-songwriter Catherine MacLellan will set the tone with a screening of her National Film Board documentary The Song and the Sorrow, directed by Millefiore Clarkes, and a duo performance following. The film captures Catherine's personal struggle to reconcile a family tragedy, confront the hurtful mystery of her absent father, Gene MacLellan, and embrace his musical legacy, as well as break the silence surrounding mental illness. Kim Barlow recently had a conversation with Catherine about music, mental health, and her father's legacy. Here is what she said.

Kim Barlow (KB): What do you try to use and carry on, from your dad's songwriting? What do you try to do differently?

Catherine MacLellan (CM): My dad was my greatest songwriting teacher. His ability to find a great melody is sort of intangible but I feel from learning his songs I've been paying more attention to that. Finding a melody and lyrics that embrace each other seamlessly is my goal. He was very good at that. There never seems to be an awkward singing moment in his songs.

KB: When it comes to dealing with depression, what tools do you use to take care of yourself, that you wish your dad had known about and implemented?

CM: For me the greatest tools are meditation and exercise. Being in my body instead of my brain with yoga helps a lot. Trying to stay in the present moment instead of always worrying about the future or the past is a constant battle, but one worth fighting. But truly the best tool, and the one I wish my dad could've used, is the power of talking to people about mental health. Reducing the stigma around mental health through conversation has been the most helpful thing for me.

KB: Do you think being a musician takes more of a toll on mental health than other occupations, or does the act of playing music improve your mental health, as the studies say? Is it a bit of both, and which side wins the day?

CM: Writing and sharing songs has been very therapeutic for me. It helps me understand and deal with my emotions in a very tangible way. But the environment of the music business is very challenging for my mental health. There is no stability in schedules, or financially, and that has certainly taken a toll on me. I have found by using exercise and meditation that I can counteract most of the negative effects.

KB: You spent a few years focusing on the shows, this film, and making an album of your father's songs. It must have been pretty intense at times. How do you feel about that process, in hindsight? Was it healing? Do you have any regrets?

CM: These last few years of focusing on my father's music and life have been life-changing for me. In a strange way I've discovered more about myself through learning about my dad and I've also found my confidence in ways I never thought I would. It has certain ly been healing and I have no regrets. I am ready, though, to get back to my own journey through music and excited to release a new album of my own music.

KB: What inspired the songs on the new record?

CM: As always for me, life is the best inspiration. I find the honesty and vulnerability help me connect with people. I've gone through a hard breakup of a long relationship, but also



started a new one, and my life has gotten so much better in the last few years. In that way, the new album is full of songs that have come from that journey.

KB: Where did you record it, and who's on it? How did it go in the studio? What are you most excited about with this new collection?

CM: The album took a lot longer than I thought it would. There were a lot of road blocks and diversions - mainly from working on my dad's music. I started out working with my last producer and ended up producing it myself after some creative differences that couldn't be resolved. That was so liberating for me and I really enjoyed the process in the end. I'm excited about some of the new sounds and players on the record. I found a real attraction to the traditional music sounds of PEI and they have found their way into my music, and with that came collaborations with some amazing trad players from home. I'm also madly in love with Clare MacDonald's drumming. She's incredible and brought such life to the songs.

KB: "Waiting on My Love" is sweet and upbeat while looking the hard times square in the face. So redemptive! What was the seed behind this one?

CM: This song is about being in the moment and appreciating exactly where you are. I find it better to lean into the good and bad times, to walk through life's troubles instead of trying to get around them. It is joyful for me, to recognize that life will always be full of ups and downs and learning to go with the flow instead of always fighting against things.

KB: For the last couple of years you've found creative ways to work as a musician without the difficult regime of constant touring. How has this affected your career and home-life? Will you keep up this approach?

CM: The last few years I've had the great opportunity to play summer shows at home in one venue for the entire season. That has given me a stronger foundation for my family life and still an ability to make a living.

As long as I'm able to do that I will; it has been very grounding. I suppose, though, that life as a musician will always be unpredictable but I've discovered a sense of faith that everything will always be alright in the end.

Catherine MacLellan will be performing at the Deep Roots Music Festival on Thursday September 26 at 7pm at the Horton Performance Centre. The evening will begin with a screening of The Song and The Sorrow.


























THE WILDLIFE ILLUSTRATIONS OF KAITLIN BAUER

We are not alone. Humans share planet Earth with a tremendous variety of other life forms. The animals around us look back at us, aware, holding us to account perhaps. Kaitlin Bauer is one who sees and pays homage through her fine wildlife drawings.

The connection between animal and human is so often through the eyes, and Bauer understands that bond. Whether her subject is a great horned owl or a grizzly bear, she captures the direct stare or coy expression of the seemingly inattentive. She aims for the candid moment, placing each animal in its natural setting. It is the fine detail which often makes the difference and that is where she places her concentration. She works from carefully chosen photos she either takes herself or which she has permission to reference. Countless tiny strokes of her graphite pencil and pen build textures of fur or feather. "I work with graphite pencils, erasers, and some sculpting tools for indenting in the beginning stages of my work. Once the piece I'm working on reaches a point that I'm happy with, I start working over the pencil in fine tip pen to add contrast and darker values to the drawing. I work using both pencil and fine tip pen until the piece is complete," Bauer explains. This is meticulous work over many hours, but Bauer puts on her headphones and happily submerges into the music and her art-making.

The story began in Powell River, British Columbia where Bauer grew up. Surrounded




by nature and wildlife, drawing was a natural impulse that began in childhood. She became obsessed with drawing horses. Then one day, she stumbled across a book that introduced her to the incredible art of renowned Canadian wildlife artist Robert Bateman. His work and dedication were an eye-opener and a great source of inspiration. Bauer had found her path. Although she eventually tried painting animals, each time she returned to her drawing, simply preferring this medium to all others. There is something innately honest about drawing.


Meeting and marrying her husband brought Bauer to Nova Scotia, first to Digby in 2016, and then to Auburn in October 2018. Now with his encouragement, she is determined and focused on her art. The life of an artist is the life of an entrepreneur. She researches her subjects, honing her skills, and learning new techniques. She takes pride in the overall quality of her work and, due to advances in technology, she is happily able to produce her own prints in addition to the original drawings. She also spends time marketing and promoting her work through her website and social media. Participating in local craft markets, such as the recent one in Kentville, enables Bauer to meet folks who purchase her work, which she really enjoys. "I want people to appreciate wildlife," she smiles, "these are amazing creatures."

People have taken notice of Bauer's work. First, she was approached by a restaurant in Bear River to hang her work, which gained her local attention, and then in 2017, Blue Mind Gallery, also in Bear River, asked to carry her drawings. That relationship has proven very successful and her work is now enjoyed far and wide. "I genuinely love drawing. Animals are incredible and I don't want to forget why I started," says Bauer, "I have a long list of animals I want to draw." This is only the beginning for this young artist.

RECIPE: Asian Nachos from The Kitchen Party Cookbook

Cabbage is one of my favourite year-round Nova Scotian vegetables. I love it cooked in soups and curries, in salads, or in the tangy sesame slaw used to top this fantastically flavourful nacho mash-up. The slaw can be made a day or two in advance and also makes an excellent all-season side dish. The wonderful folks at Taproot Farm grow a variety of beautiful cabbages. I pick mine up at their farm stand or at Noggins!

If you have a deep-fryer and are ambitious, $\ensuremath{\mathsf{try}}$ frying up some quartered wonton wrappers and use them in place of the nacho chips. Just a warning, this isn't the same as the nachos that are served at Union Street—those are downright addictive—but it is truly delicious!

For the Sesame Slaw

- 2 C finely shredded green or red cabbage
- 1 medium carrot, grated
- 1/4 C chopped cilantro
- 2 Tbsp apple cider vinegar

• 1 Tbsp canola oil

- 1 bag (around 300g) tortilla chips
- 2 cups grated Monterey Jack or cheddar

For the sesame slaw, mix the cabbage, carrot, cilantro, vinegar, sesame oil and sugar and salt in a bowl and toss to combine thoroughly. Set aside.

Combine the pork, ginger, garlic, soy sauce, sugar, and sriracha sauce in a bowl and mix thoroughly. Heat a medium frying pan over medium heat. Add the oil and tilt to coat the pan. Crumble in the pork mixture and cook, stirring frequently, until pork is cooked and browned, about ten minutes. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Spread the tortilla chips over a large ovenproof serving platter or cookie

Sprinkle with the meat mixture, then the cheese. Bake for 10-15 minutes, until cheese is melted. When the cheese has melted, remove the nachos from the oven and top with the slaw mixture. Serve immediately.

Note: I keep my ginger in the freezer and grate it with a rasp as needed. It stays perfect this way for months.







Bernie Zinck, in my opinion, is one of the most talented local musicians we have here in the Valley. I have known Bernie for close to 30 years, as we attended the same high school together: the *original* KCA. I've been following Bernie and his music adventures for many years, and I'm so excited to finally feature him in my Who's Who column!

Bernie was born and raised in Kentville, and was a prominent member of KCA's celebrated band program! Bernie started playing guitar when he was eight years old, then he learned bass guitar, drums, mandolin, banjo, ukulele, and has dabbled in many other instruments. In his grade 12 year, Bernie was diagnosed with a degenerative eye condition called retinitis pigmentosa. Little was known about the condition at that time, and Bernie was told he would eventually go blind, but the doctors didn't know when. With an uncertain and unpredictable future, he wanted to see the world, so he decided to move to Hollywood, California and attend the prestigious Musician's Institute.

On his experience in California, Bernie notes, "along with the amazing instructors, I had the opportunity to study with famous musicians like Kirk Hammett (Metallica), members of Cheap Trick, Steve Vai, studio legend Tommy Tedesco, and jazz great Joe Diorio, just to name a few. Upon graduation, I moved back to the Valley and started a thriving private music teaching career, which now spans over

Bernie is a private music instructor, bandleader, multi-instrumentalist, singer, songwriter, composer, and producer, just to name a few things! I told you he was talented folks, and those few labels don't even begin to cut it! As a performer, Bernie currently has four musical projects on the go (which is a low number for such a busy guy, but Bernie has a young daughter now so priorities have shifted a bit!). "I play solo acoustic shows which are a lot of fun," he says. "I also have a duo/band with long time friend Melissa Vidito called The Melberns, that plays country, pop, soul, R&B, rock, and everything in between. I have a three piece blues and classic rock band called The Bernie Zinck Band and I am bandleader/ bassist/vocalist for the 15-piece Valley mega group Bluesmobile. As a songwriter and producer, I've had my music featured on TV shows such as Sony/Lifetime's The Lizzie Borden Chronicles and NBC's hit show Chicago Fire.

So, I know this Who's Who is about Bernie but after the last paragraph it's pretty clear that the musical talent that flows through this Valley is interconnected and very vibrant. Melissa Vidito is my first cousin and I have known about her incredible talent since birth. Watching her and Bernie make music together is very special. Once you add in the other talented Bluesmobile artists with many famous



faces like Darrin Harvey, Sarah Pound Gaetz, Doug Murley, Tim Fisk, and many more, Bernie clearly associates with the cream of the crop and his concerts, small music shows, and independent projects are well worth following.

"Music is my life," Bernie says. "I love teaching, playing, and writing. It's all I do, aside from spending time with my partner Anne Marie (another great musician) and our beautiful daughter Morganne, who keeps me busy and is my best creation ever! Besides music consuming a lot of my time, I do dabble in video editing a little, as the doctors did not predict that my vision would hang on this long. Although my peripheral and night vision has deteriorated, my central vision is hanging in there and I am very fortunate. I live every day to the fullest and don't let my eye condition stop me from anything I want to do. Yes, it's a part of me, but does not define me. I have been able to do what I love and make a living doing it. What more could I ask for? I am a lucky guy, I have a wonderful family, great friends, and the best job ever!"

To end on a rather exciting note: Bernie is in the process of becoming an ambassador for the CNIB (Canadian National Institute for the Blind). His job as an ambassador will be to educate the public about people with vision loss and that being visually impaired doesn't mean you can't see at all. Nothing seems to stop this very talented man! The Box of Delights Bookshop has officially announced that the store will be closing at the end of September, 2019. This news has been met with a mixture of sadness and nostalgia from the community.

Founded in 1972 by Hilary Sircom, The Box of Delights Bookshop is named after the British children's novel by John Masefield. In 1991, it was purchased by Mitzi DeWolfe, who upheld a high standard of community-oriented bookselling during some difficult times in the industry. The beloved bookshop carried a wide range of genres with a special focus on children's books and local interest, as well as a selection of stationery by local artists.

However, this space was much more than a bookshop. It was a box office for community events, a space for public dialogue and literary gatherings, and a testing ground for emerging

authors, poets, publishers, and artists. For many years, *The* Grapevine used The Box of Delights as our headquarters, alongside the Deep Roots Music Festival. The downstairs level provided a space for this paper to grow and flourish. Cultural hub spaces like The Box of Delights are important to fledgling organizations, as they provide an arena for the exchange of social and cultural capital. We owe our close relationship with the Deep Roots Music Festival to The Box of Delights, as well as many of our connections to local writers, academics, and engaged citizens.

With heavy hearts, we bid farewell to The Box of Delights Bookshop. We can only hope that this storefront in the heart of Wolfville will appeal to another community-minded individual like Mitzi.

FLYING SQUIRREL ADVENTURES OFFER GREAT WAYS TO GET OUTSIDE THIS FALL

After a brief summer hiatus, the Flying Squirrel Adventures program will be resuming its monthly nature outing series in the Kentville Ravine. Flying Squirrel Adventures (FSA) is a collaborative program between the Blomidon Naturalists Society, Jijuktu'kwejk Watershed Alliance, and the Town of Kentville which aims to inform, inspire and connect nature lovers of all ages in the Valley through guided outdoor explorations.

This summer the program chose to offer a series of five special outings atdifferent locations throughout Kings County, instead of the monthly meetings at the Kentville Ravine which the program had been offering previously. "We wanted to explore some new nature spots and provide programming in other areas to reach new audiences," explains FSA program coordinator, Judy Lipp about the summer schedule. In September FSA will be returning to the monthly format they first established with the program's inception in 2018. This involves free events at the Kentville Ravine the third Saturday of each month in which a guest presenter, an expert in their respective field, guides an outing for community members to learn about a certain aspect of the local environment.

Being the remnant of one of only a few old growth forests in our region, the ravine offers a unique and diverse biological environment while featuring maintained trails and public transport accessibility on the Kings Transit line. Topics vary, but the meetings always begin with an opening circle at 10am. The group talks about the subject they'll be exploring that day and participates in some activities together before dividing into two groups, one with a guide geared more toward children and another for adults, so as to ensure all visitors get the most from their morning. The event wraps up just after noon with a final closing circle where all participants are invited to share the highlights and lessons from their morning.

The next session will be held on September 21. Dalhousie researcher Simon Gadbois will be on hand with red golden retriever Ivy, for a demonstration on dogs and their use in conservation efforts, such as monitoring and detecting different plants and animals.

According to Lipp, the goal of FSA is to re-connect people to nature through a blend of education, exploration, and simply allowing people to be outside in a beautiful location. "We want to cultivate an understanding of and a lifelong love for nature, which will in turn promote respect for the natural world on which we so depend, as well as encourage active, outdoor living." However, its also about having fun and playing together as a community. "It's in [children's] nature to play outside," says FSA facilitator Emily LeGrand. "Today many kids are leading a more sedentary, indoor-dominated lifestyle (adults too), with serious consequences for their



well-being. We are part of a growing movement to address that by reminding people to get outside and play regardless of their age. Nature can teach us so much about ourselves, others, and the natural world. Being deeply nature-connected leads to love and respect for the natural environment and a sense of inner peace." In these tumultuous times we could all use a dose of that medicine.

With that in mind, FSA is also looking forward to new programs this fall aimed at further promoting local interest in nature and healthy living, such as the interactive field guide project, which allows the public to help identify and catalogue flora and fauna within the bounds of the ravine through the app iNaturalist, as well as helping create a

research database for naturalists and scientists, both amateur and professional. Also new is the Forest Play program for preschoolers, where once a week children aged 3 to 4 will get the chance to play and explore around the Kentville Gorge with program facilitators. Although this particular program is now full, the FSA team would be happy to hear of any further interest from parents to help inform future programming.

You will find many theatres, museums, and displays celebrating the First Lady of Comedy and, also, The National Comedy Centre (opened in 2018 and quickly becoming one of the most attended attractions in North America).

Each August the Lucille Ball Comedy Festival takes place in Jamestown, and in celebration of my 40th birthday this year, I fulfilled a dream of mine and spent five days in Jamestown, surrounded by Lucy-loving folks from all over the world: comedians, laughter, food, fun, and polka dots abounded, and I sincerely came back to Wolfville a changed man!



people, swam in laughter and good cheer, saw fantastic performers, embraced the small independent businesses and hometown feel that makes Jamestown special, and I loved every minute of it!

Jamestown reminded me so much of Wolfville! With the release of Jan L. Coates' new children's book, Say What You Mean, Mean What You Say, Nevermore Press in Lunenburg will be donating one dollar from the sale of each book to Feed Nova Scotia from now through October 14, Thanksgiving Day. Say What You Mean is the second middle-grade novel published under Nevermore's Trap Door Books imprint.

Against a background of magical realism, Coates takes Jake on a journey that finds him volunteering at the Hope Pantry soup kitchen and roaming the grounds of the West End Mental Health Centre in search of the Crazy Good Choir. Along the way, Jake discovers that people who are homeless and hungry aren't just bums, and that people who struggle with mental health issues aren't about to "Jekyll out on you."

"This book deals with current issues—homelessness, poverty and mental health—in a way that young readers can relate to, and explores the impact they have on individuals and families. We wanted to do something that not only heightens awareness of the issues but also makes a concrete contribution," said Ernest Hadley, publisher and editor of Nevermore



Press. "Teaming up with Feed Nova Scotia is a natural fit, particularly since over one-third of those receiving food bank assistance are children."

Feed Nova Scotia is a registered charity that relies on donations from the community to fulfill its mission. Every two dollars raised by Feed Nova Scotia provides three meals.

HURRICANE DORIAN SQUASHES THIS YEAR'S WINDSOR-WEST HANTS PUMPKIN REGATTA

It is with great sadness that the Windsor-West have focused in the past several years on Hants Pumpkin Festival committee announced the cancellation of this year's 21st Annual Pumpkin Regatta.

The majority of gourds for the regatta come from the Dill Family Farm in Windsor. This year's growing season had a very late start with May and June being exceptionally wet and fields unable to be plowed and planted. When transplants were finally set, July and most of August were exceptionally hot and dry, hampering growth. And then came Hurricane Dorian, whose category 2 winds and heavy rains severely damaged vines and leaves that provide nutrients to the gourds.

To run a successful regatta, there needs to be in excess of 60 gourds available. The Dills growing gourds in the 600-800 pound range. which are used specifically for the regatta. The Dills, like so many other Nova Scotia farmers, are still surveying the damage from Dorian. Simply, there will not be enough gourds to supply PVCs (personal vegetable craft) to the pumpkin paddlers. "It was only fair to let paddlers know as soon as possible" said Danny Dill, who already had bookings from pumpkin athletes as far away as Alberta.

After 20 successful Regattas, it is a sad day in the Land of Giants, but there are still many regional farm markets, u-picks and events to make the Great Pumpkin proud, and PLAN B is being floated for a Family Fun October!





RISE UP AND RUN TO BENEFIT **CHRYSALIS HOUSE**

Chrysalis House is a non-profit grassroots organization that has been providing shelter, support, counselling, advocacy, outreach, and transitional supports to women and their children escaping violence for more than 30 years. Chrysalis House works with individuals, organizations, learning institutions, and businesses in our community to end violence against women in order to create healthier communities and families.

The primary goal of Chrysalis House is to provide a safe place for women and children escaping abuse. The secondary goal is to support women and children through service delivery and programming. We provide many in-house and outreach services, including the children's program which focuses on promoting children's strengths and self-esteem in a welcoming, safe, and caring environment; the art program, which promotes women and children coming together to connect, create, and share in a community setting where they feel safe and supported; and women's programs designed to assist women in recognizing the patterns of abusive relationships and the warning signs of control and abuse and improving financial security. We also offer joint programs like Women Independent Now (WIN) with Annapolis Valley Health (Mental Health and Addictions Services). The shelter service is located in Kentville, Nova Scotia and serves the communities of Kings, Annapolis, and West Hants counties. The shelter and distress/support line operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Services are provided by 15 permanent employees. There are absolutely no fees for service.

In its current state, Chrysalis House diverts substantial operating funds towards maintaining and repairing an aging structure that does not meet the needs of service users and staff. We are raising funds towards the construction of a new shelter that will be accessible and include much needed space

for other organizations we work closely with. Our innovative design will allow for a hub of related community services and will build capacity in our community and increase access to services for families experiencing violence. Chrysalis House has been most fortunate to have received so much support from the community and funders and we truly hope that this will continue as we work towards achieving our new initiative, Project Renew.

With Project Renew upon us, we are always looking for new ways to fund raise and to include the community so they are aware of the services the shelter provides. When Andrea Watts, a fellow board member, suggested a run, I jumped aboard and we started the process of organizing it, all the way back in February! "It is never too early to introduce kids to art," explains Laurie Dalton, director and curator of the Acadia Art Gallery.

Many parents are nervous about taking their children to an art gallery. Is it appropriate? Will they be bored? Will they be the one to knock over the sculpture?

Dalton gives the following tips:

Bring a bag of colour swatches and shapes. Give each child a colour or shape and ask them to find something in the gallery that is the same shape or colour. Buy a postcard at the gift shop before entering the gallery and get kids to be on the lookout for that piece, or ask the child to make up a story about the artwork. The important part is to have them talking about and looking at art. You will be amazed at what you learn!



WISE ACADIA CAMP FULL STEAM AHEAD: A GREAT SUCCESS

From August 6 to 9, WISE (Women in Science and Engineering) Acadia held its third annual overnight summer science camp for girls entering grades 7 and 8. The Full STEAM Ahead camp was organized by a planning Team of WISE Acadia faculty, staff, and students and welcomed thirty campers from across the province to the Acadia University campus. The girls experienced a variety of speakers, workshops, arts-based activities, and many fun events (including the leaders 'roasting' marshmallows for s'mores under a broiler due to the fire ban, while the campers checked out the skies using telescopes from the physics department). The eleven to thirteen year old girls participated in ten workshops run by Acadia faculty and students, as well as WISE partners. Over the four-day period the girls experienced topics including Coding 101 – with robots (computer science), Best of Boat Worlds (engineering), Drink your Ink (biology), Girls in Motion mLAB (kinesiology), STEAMSpace Marshmallow Challenge (business) and WISE Women of the World (education). As well as highlighting science, our camp focused on how the integration of arts enhances learning in science education by encouraging students to think creatively and develop unique solutions to problems.

Campers who attended shared with us that one of the most popular sessions of the week was a mentoring session hosted by female students at Acadia, who are studying a broad

spectrum of STEAM subjects (science, technology, engineering, arts, and math). In small group discussions, the Acadia students shared their experiences and research interests with the campers, some who will be the scientists of the future. Acadia students were also involved as residence assistants and in shepherding the campers around the campus.

Supporting girls learning about science at a young age and being exposed to mentors who work in STEAM fields has been shown to make a difference in the career choices they make. SUNDAY MUSIC IN THE GARDEN ROOM OPENS **ANOTHER EXCITING SEASON**

Sunday Music in the Garden Room opens its 20 season on September 22 with the dynamic violin and piano duo meagan&amy at 2pm in the Garden Room of the K.C. Irving Environmental Science Centre on University Avenue in Wolfville. Pianist Meagan Milatz and violinist Amy Hillis, both Saskatchewan born and bred, and now based in Montreal, are the first to have been awarded "Road Trip! A Pan-Canadian Tour", a co-operative undertaking by three of the chief classical music impresario organizations in Canada, Prairie Debut (in existence for over 20 years), Debut Atlantic (on its 40th anniversary), and Jeunesses Musicales Canada (on its 70th). The tour is a mammoth venture for the artists, taking them to 57 cities and towns in all provinces and territories of Canada, from Newfoundland and Nunavut to British Columbia, the Yukon, and the Northwest Territories, beginning in Nova Scotia on September 14, 2019, and finishing in New Brunswick on May 23, 2020, criss-crossing the country many

Flanked by this concert and another Debut Atlantic offering on November 10, a concert by the "rapturous and glowing" Polish-Canadian pianist Daniel Wnukowski, will be two concerts by returning, more local, artists. On October 6, the Blue Engine String Quartet will be joined by pianist John Hansen, and on October 20, pianist Lucas Porter and David Parker, French horn, present a concert.

In the New Year, a trio composed of Eileen Walsh, clarinet, Gillian Smith, violin, and Simon Docking, piano, will be heard on February 2. On March 15 there will be another Debut Atlantic concert, a trumpet and piano duo, Merkelo & Fung. Finishing out the season, the William Marshall Bishop Memorial Concert on May 3 sees a return visit from the extraordinary violin and piano duo, the Bouey-Doucet Duo, introduced to us by Debut Atlantic a few years ago. 🏖

Eight years ago I had the wonderful opportunity to be the student intern for the Deep Roots Music Festival. During my summer contract, I was tasked to work on the Indigenous programming for the event. You may remember, 2011 was the year celebrated indigenous singer Kinnie Starr and the indigenous band Digging Roots headlined. To complement the headlining acts, we had performers from Bear River lead the community in traditional song and dances in Clock Park, and at the Wolfville Farmers' Market. That experience opened up a whole new world to me, and I have since worked with indigenous arts communities across Atlantic Canada.

The Deep Roots Music Festival's original purpose was to be a musical celebration of the four founding cultures: Mi'kmaq, Acadian, Gaelic/Scottish, and African. I am very excited to announce that this year has strong Mi'kmaq representation once again.

To kick off the weekend of events, there will be a smudging ceremony at 6:15pm in the Festival Theatre parking lot performed by the Melgita't Women. This is a ritual of burning plant resins and herbs to clear away negative energy and invite in peace and harmony (deeprootsmusic.ca/2019/07/melgitat-women-2).

On Friday, September 27 at 7pm Alan Syliboy & The Thundermakers are playing a multimedia set at the Kings County Museum.

This group features Hubert Francis as the lead vocalist. Francis, who performed with his band Eagle Feather for many years and received a Juno in 1994, has recently been awarded a lifetime achievement award from the East Coast Music Awards (kingscountymuseum.ca/events).

On Saturday, September 28 at 3pm, Alan Syliboy will be making an appearance again, along with Mika Francis, Emma Stevens, and Rachel Whitney, expressing their cultural roots through song, drumming, and visual art at the Al Whittle Theatre. This *Idle No More: Truth & Reconciliation* performance will feature a weaving of traditional teachings with songs to honour the knowledge and resilience of Mi'kmaq ancestors and communities (deeprootsmusic.ca/2019/07/ alan-syliboy-and-the-thundermakers).

For the festival finale on Sunday, September 29 at 1pm, Alan Syliboy & The Thundermakers will be performing again, as well as Emma Stevens, who is an Eskasoni high schooler who rose to fame when she released a cover of "Blackbird" by The Beatles sung entirely in the Mi'kmaq language. The video has received a million views since April 2019, and a shout-out from Paul McCartney himself (deeprootsmusic.ca/2019/07/emma-stevens).

Newcomers gentle yoga is led at an easy pace and emphasizes stretching and relaxed breathing. The most important yoga postures and principles are taught.


Over thirty people expressed interest in the new series of classes during sign-up time at the September Newcomers Club. Many of




